One of those moments came at Sam’s Town Casino, when an entire room went completely quiet—no talking, no machines—just to hear her sing. That was Emma. She didn’t just perform... she created moments people carried with them.

She loved to entertain, to laugh, and to bring joy to others. Whether she was on stage or simply being herself, she had a way of turning ordinary moments into something special. She didn’t just live life—she made sure everyone around her felt it.

Emma’s faith was quiet but strong. She didn’t need to speak loudly about it because she lived it. She walked comfortably with God and Jesus Christ, carrying a peace and strength that guided her throughout her life. We find comfort in knowing that today, she is singing once again—this time in Heaven, her beautiful voice joining the choir of angels, just as it always seemed it was meant to.

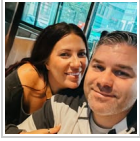
