



Wilton Russell Easter Sr

July 2, 1924 - January 14, 2018

Wilton Russell Easter, Sr., died peacefully in his sleep on January 14, 2018, at the age of 93. We are confident that, as a lifelong believer in Jesus Christ, he is now at home with his Lord and Saviour.

Wilton was born in Waco Texas, on July 2, 1924, to C.C. and Essie Marie Easter. He had 7 siblings.

He enlisted in the Army at the age of 18, and served in the 3rd Infantry Division of the 15th Regiment in the Italian Campaign at Anzio Beach.

Wilton loved golf and enjoyed spending time with his golfing buddies. On July 19, 1994, at the age of 70 and with two artificial knees, Wilton shot an incredible 9 under par 63 at Cottonwood Creek Golf Course, which was the course record, and was reported on the front page of the Waco Tribune Herald. This record still stands today.

Wilton married Ruby Rose Powell on September 6, 1945 in Oglesby, Texas. They were married over 70 years and were blessed with five children . Ruby proceeded him in death on February 10, 2016.

Wilton was also proceeded in death by his parents, siblings Jack Wayne, J.C., Evelyn, Mary Lou, and Charles Lee; sons-in-law, Paul D. Skeleton and Bill Stillwell, and his son, Ron. He is survived by brothers Bill and Bob Easter, his

children Martha, Anne and husband Paul Gibson, Bill and wife Diane Easter, and Margaret and husband, Steve Linsteadt, grandchildren Todd, Stephanie, Amanda, David, Emily, Brittany, and Nicole, 24 great grandchildren and one great great grandchild.

Wilton will be buried by his beloved wife at the Texas Veterans Cemetery in Killeen, Texas. No services are planned.
